It was inspiring to see such activity and energy on our beautiful campus (and thank you to the Building and Grounds and Facilities teams for making it look so inviting).

It's not surprising why students would choose CSI, especially if they saw the activities on campus associated with "Spirit Week." With pep rallies, food trucks, carnival games, and more, our campus truly came alive this week. This is important on a number of levels: students who are engaged are students who are happy...and happy students are returning students, so this was as much about student engagement, which drives enrollment.
